Quaker Academies follows federal and Ohio guidelines regarding a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) to students eligible for special education. The special education department serves as a basis for policies and procedures for the special education department. Currently we serve about 100 students in our Quaker Academies.

At Quaker Academies, we provide a remote learning environment. Special educational services from licensed intervention specialists provide individual attention to student needs. Support services in speech and occupational therapy are provided through online meeting rooms, phone meetings, and electronic communications.

Quaker Digital Academies provides online services, including the provision of supplementary aids and services determined appropriate and necessary by the child's IEP team. The intervention specialists provide nonacademic and extracurricular services and activities for children with disabilities as an equal opportunity for participation in those services and activities as provided to students without disabilities. Our intervention specialists provide individual tutoring in all subjects to assist students. Quaker Academies modifies curriculum meeting students' individual needs in the curriculum and provides outstanding services for all students and families.

QDA Across America

Mr. Casini will be sharing this once-in-a-lifetime experience with students throughout the school year:

Two years ago, a group of sixth graders located in Mill Creek, Oklahoma, was wondering if anything exciting had ever happened in their small town. Their teacher at the time, Mr. Jones, challenged them to research and discover a historic event that occurred in Mill Creek.



What they discovered reached back to almost eighty years to the onset of WWII and brought total strangers together in remembrance of a fatal midair collision. Eleven men, including my uncle and namesake, Anthony Thomas Casini, perished in a B-17 accident at Ardmore Army Base on February 12, 1944.

These eleven students, under the guidance of their 8th grade teacher, Julie Kirkpatrick, were determined to honor these veterans by estab-

lishing a monument. They were able to raise approximately \$8,000 through donations and fundraisers during a two-year span.

My journey began on June 2nd with excitement and anticipation traveling by car for 18 hours to Mill Creek. While traveling through multiple states, I was able to share interesting facts with my students as a way of encouraging their extended learning opportunities. Thus, the idea of QDA Across America was launched. The objective of each video was to report historical facts and trivia regarding each state I traveled through, which included: Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, and Oklahoma.

On June 5th, we arrived in Mill Creek and were extremely honored to be there. The ceremony was both somber and heartwarming. The determination and pride demonstrated by the students and their teacher was inspirational.

There were approximately 200 people in attendance, including five other members of my family. As part of the memorial, there was a National Guard Quintet, and honorary speeches provided by Col. Robert Walker, and other dignitaries representing the armed forces.

A special thanks goes to Dr. Richard Varrati for providing me with the opportunity to share this monument dedication with my students and allowing me to demonstrate that learning can be fun and truly does happen "anywhere".




